#### I. Welcome and Introductions

Ms. Windy Graham welcomed everyone, and committee members gave introductions.

#### II. Approval of January 3, 2023, Minutes

The January 3, 2023, minutes were approved electronically through an email vote.

#### III. Committee Education – Department of Social Services

Ms. Christina Roberts, Upstate Transition Specialist for DSS, shared a presentation with committee members. Ms. Roberts works with the John H. Chafee Foster Care Program for Successful Transition to Adulthood. The Chafee program is tasked with assisting teenagers and young adults, ages 14-26, as they transition out of the foster care system. The DSS Chafee program provides services and funding for youth that relate to their future goals and independence. This funding covers academic assistance, transportation assistance, employment assistance, and housing assistance. The ETV program covers up to \$5,000 per year for college tuition and other costs for young adults up to their 26<sup>th</sup> birthday. Financial literacy workshops are available as well. Ms. Roberts provided her contact information to committee members.

Mr. Billy Hunter provided an update for the SC Works Centers. The Anderson SC Works Center, beginning March 13 will be open Monday-Friday from 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m. The center will no longer be closed for lunch. There is a temporary sign that has been placed on the outside of the Anderson center until a permanent sign is placed. WorkLink is assisting Frankische with a Rapid Response event for 170 employees. SC Works center surveys have recently become digital. Mr. Hunter stated approximately 2100 surveys have been sent, 280 read receipts, and 127 survey responses.

Ms. Windy Graham, staff to the WorkLink Board, referenced reports in the packet.

The targeted population WIOA data is found on pages 4-6 . Aggregate information is given for July 2022 to February 2023.

Beginning on page 7, Ms. Graham reviewed the SC Employment Situation from January 2023 that the SC Department of Employment and Workforce released.

The Community Profile was available in the packet, beginning on page 7. Ms. Graham stated that the Community Profile shows economic, demographic, industry, occupation, and education data for the Anderson, Oconee, and Pickens areas. The report can be revised to show individual counties and is updated approximately every 6 weeks. The economic outlook for January 2023 was included on page 18 of the packet. The South Carolina employment situation was located on page 22 of the packet.

WorkLink's unemployment rate is 2.7%, and the population of those with disabilities is higher nationwide at 7.1%. The percentage of our labor force with a disability is 24.1% (data from US Department of Labor).

#### IV. Other Business

Ms. Graham shared that the next committee meeting will be on May 2, 2023. Ms. Graham stated she would reach out to a potential speaker for the next meeting.





Last month, as required under the Workforce Information Grant that we administer, DEW prepared and submitted these figures by industry and occupation for the 2022-2024 window. While no one has a crystal ball, this represents where we expect the state's workforce, all else being equal, to be by the end of next year. Overall, it is expected that there will be nearly 600,000 job openings in that time, with a little less than 50,000 of those coming from new jobs being created in South Carolina. 


# SOUTH CAROLINA SHORT-TERM EMPLOYMENT PROJECTIONS (2022-2024)

The Labor Market Information (LMI) Division of the South Carolina Department of Employment and Workforce is responsible for yearly short-term employment projections. These projections cover two years and estimate the distribution of employees by industry and occupation based on the jobs needed to staff a worksite. To comprehend this data, it's crucial to differentiate between numeric and percent changes. The former indicates an increase or decrease in job availability or employment, while the latter identifies the growth rate of industries and occupations over two years.


LMI also produces data identifying which occupations and industries are growing or shrinking the fastest and at what rates they are expected to have the highest employment gains. **Figure 1** shows projected annual job openings divided into three categories: openings due to industry growth, transfers between occupations, and exits from the labor force due to retirement or other reasons. Transfers account for more than half, exits for almost 40 percent, leaving eight percent (48,173) of openings due to the state's economic growth. However, openings due to exits may also be caused by people leaving their jobs to pursue other career options, while transfers usually represent workers transitioning to different occupations. Overall, South Carolina is expected to see 596,174 job openings through 2024.



On the next page is **Figure 2**, which highlights the top ten occupations projected to have the largest employment gains from 2022 to 2024. More than half of these positions are expected to be in customer service, with a focus on the leisure and hospitality industry. This sector took a significant hit during the COVID-19 pandemic but is now showing signs of recovery, which is critical for the state's economy given the prevalence of tourism destinations throughout the state. There has also been an uptick in employment for registered nurses and home health care aides, which were also negatively affected by the pandemic.








Occupational growth is influenced by several factors, and educational attainment plays a crucial role. Employers have raised their hiring requirements, making education even more important for jobseekers. In terms of growth, Figure 3 shows that occupations requiring a doctoral or master's degree are projected to experience the most growth, while those with no formal education, post-secondary non-degree award, associate degree, and bachelor's degrees are expected to grow overall but not as much. Occupations that require some college, but no degree are projected to decline, including computer user support specialists, teaching assistants, actors, and bookkeeping, accounting, and auditing clerks. Growth rates for each level of education were calculated by dividing the total rate of growth for all related occupations by the total number of occupations.







Employment and Workforce

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) code is used to identify specific industries, and their future payroll estimates are available as well. The fastest projected annual growth for industries is based on sectors (2-digit) as a baseline, but industry sub-sectors (3-digit) are also analyzed for comparison. The health care and social assistance sector is expected to show the largest projected employment gains, reflecting a promising renewal.

**Figure 4** highlights the sectors expected to experience the highest employment growth. The results suggest a positive shift in the health care and social assistance industry, as it showcases the largest gain by a significant margin.




**Figure 5** shows the same data but in relative terms, with the Information industry projected to experience the most growth. Transportation and Warehousing follow closely behind, with Health Care and Social Assistance falling in the middle of the pack.





Finally, Figure 6 shows that Other Information Services is projected to be the fastest-growing 3-digit sub-sector on a relative basis. It is important to note that these sub-sector industries are significantly smaller than others, which impacts the growth rate.





In summary, short-term projections indicate robust growth for South Carolina's economy and workforce, with payroll increases across most industries and occupations. More than 48,000 jobs are expected to be created between 2022 and 2024, highlighting the opportunities and challenges in developing a workforce to meet demands. Long-term projections will be available this summer for the 12 workforce development areas statewide. ## SOUTH CAROLINA'S EMPLOYMENT SITUATION (FEBRUARY 2023)

# Household Survey<sup>1</sup> (Local Area Unemployment Statistics)

**EMPLOYMENT:** The seasonally adjusted, monthly survey of households estimated the number of South Carolinians working increased to 2,306,083.

- That is a significant increase of 7,303 people over the January 2023 estimate.
- That is an increase of 10,022 people over the February 2022 estimate.

**UNEMPLOYMENT:** The estimate of unemployed people increased to 76,090.

- That is an increase of 44 people from January's estimate and a decrease of 1,143 from the February 2022 estimate.
- The state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was unchanged at 3.2 percent.
- Nationally, the unemployment rate increased from January's rate of 3.4 percent to 3.6 percent, according to the Current Population Survey.

**LABOR FORCE:** The state's estimated labor force (people working plus unemployed people looking for work) increased to 2,382,173.

- That is an increase of 7,347 people over the January estimate.
- That is an increase of 8,879 individuals over the February 2022 estimate.

# Employer Survey<sup>2</sup> (Current Employment Statistics)

# NONAGRICULTURAL EMPLOYMENT BY INDUSTRY (SEASONALLY ADJUSTED<sup>3</sup>)

The monthly survey of businesses in South Carolina marked an estimated increase of 2,100 nonfarm payroll jobs over the month to a level of 2,278,100.

- Industries that reported gains were Leisure and Hospitality (+1,900); Professional and Business Services (+1,800); and Government (+1,700).
- Financial Activities (-1,300); Education and Health Services (-600); Construction (-600); Manufacturing (-600); Other Services (-100); and Information (-100) industries declined.
- Trade, Transportation, and Utilities marked no change.

From February 2022 to February 2023, South Carolina's economy has picked up 53,900 seasonally adjusted, nonfarm jobs.

 Industries with strong growth were Education and Health Services (+13,800); Leisure and Hospitality (+10,600); Government (+8,400); Professional and Business Services (+6,600); Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (+4,300); Manufacturing (+2,400); Financial Activities (+2,100); Construction (+1,900); Information (+1,900); and Other Services (+1,700).






#### NONAGRICULTURAL EMPLOYMENT BY INDUSTRY (NOT SEASONALLY ADJUSTED4)

Not seasonally adjusted, nonfarm payroll employment increased by 20,900 from January 2023 to February 2023 for a total of 2,263,600.

- Professional and Business Services (+9,800);
   Government (+7,100); Leisure and Hospitality
   (+4,900); Education and Health Services (+2,100);
   and Construction industries (+200) increased.
- Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (-1,400); Financial Activities (-900); Manufacturing (-800); and Other Services (-100) industries marked declines.
- The Mining and Logging and Information industries showed no change over the month.

Since February 2022, not seasonally adjusted, nonfarm jobs were up 56,000 in South Carolina.


 Industries making strong annual gains were Educational and Health Services (+13,100); Professional and Business Services (+8,900); Government (+8,900); Leisure and Hospitality (+8,600); Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (+4,600); Construction (+3,400); Financial Activities (+3,000); Information (+2,200); Other Services (+1,700); Manufacturing (+1,400); and Mining and Logging (+200).





#### MONTHLY LABOR FORCE PARTICIPATION RATE SINCE JANUARY 2020





## **TECHNICAL NOTES**

- 1. Household Survey: Nationally, there is a monthly Current Population Survey of about 60,000 households conducted by the Census Bureau for the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) to determine employment status of the civilian population. This information, along with other inputs, are used by DEW to operate the Local Area Unemployment Statistics program, which estimates the number of individuals employed and those not employed, but actively seeking employment for statewide and a variety of sub-state geographies.
- Employer Survey: BLS conducts a monthly Current Employment Statistics survey of about 44,000 employers which yields national estimates of nonagricultural wage and salary employment, hours, and earnings by industry. This data is processed by DEW to generate comparable data for the state and its metropolitan statistical areas.
- Seasonally Adjusted: Seasonal adjustment removes the
  effects of events that follow a regular pattern each year (i.e.
  tourist-related hiring and school closings in the summer).
  These adjustments make it easier to observe the cyclical and
  other nonseasonal movements in data over time.
- 4. **Not Seasonally Adjusted:** Effects of regular or seasonal patterns have not been removed from this data.

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




## **ECONOMIC OUTLOOK**

The South Carolina Leading Index (SCLI) rose in March to a value (following revisions) of 102.37.

SCLI metrics were mostly improved in March. Unemployment claims were 3.7 percent lower than in February. The number of issued housing permits rose 25.7 percent month-over-month while valuation for the permits rose 27.4 percent. Average weekly manufacturing hours were down 2.1 percent. The Dow Jones Composite Average was up 1.0 percent.



South Carolina's total non-seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment rose by 11,200 net jobs to 2,276,000 in March, which was 0.5 percent higher than February numbers and 4.1 percent higher than one year ago. Sectors reporting net job gains for the month included Leisure and Hospitality (9,000); Government (2,400); Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (2,400); Manufacturing (1,200); Information (500); and Finance (400). Net job losses were reported in the Professional and Business Services (-4,200); Other Services (-300); and Educational and Health Services (-200) sectors. Construction and Natural Resources and Mining had no net change month-over-month. Compared to one year ago, the state economy added 90,500 net nonfarm jobs.


#### **Average Hourly Earnings**

# Real Estate & Business Activity

In March, the number of building permits issued in South Carolina for new residential construction rose 25.7 percent to 3,820. This figure was down 20.9 percent from one year ago. Valuation for the permits rose 27.4 percent month-over-month and was 13.6 percent lower than one year ago. Total closings were up 42.9 percent compared to February, while the median sales price was up 6.0 percent. Total closings rose in all of the six MSAs, with Spartanburg reporting the strongest gain (66.6 percent). Median sales price also rose across the six MSAs, with Columbia reporting the steepest increase at 4.3 percent.



#### **Unemployment Insurance Claims**














#### Change in Manufacturing Employment, March 2022 to March 2023
