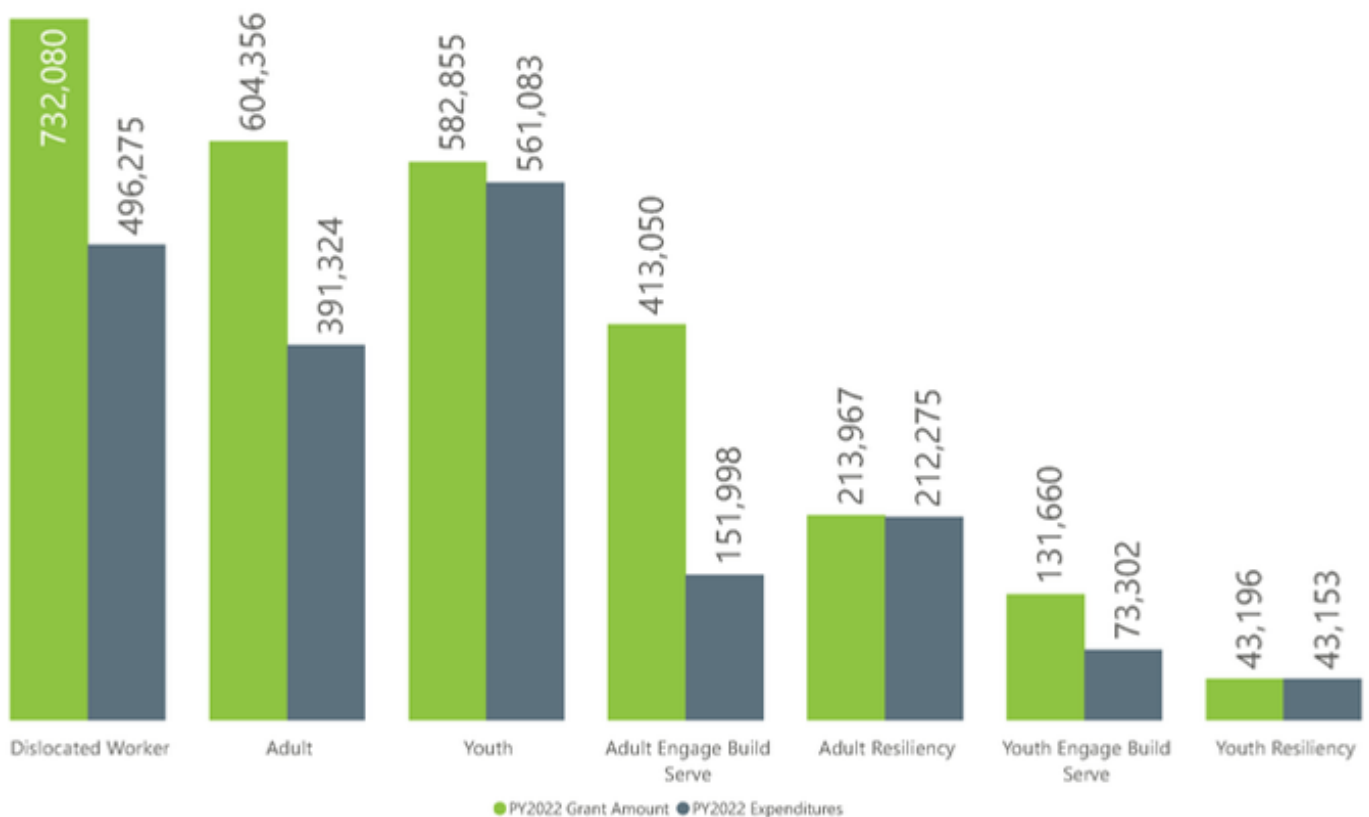

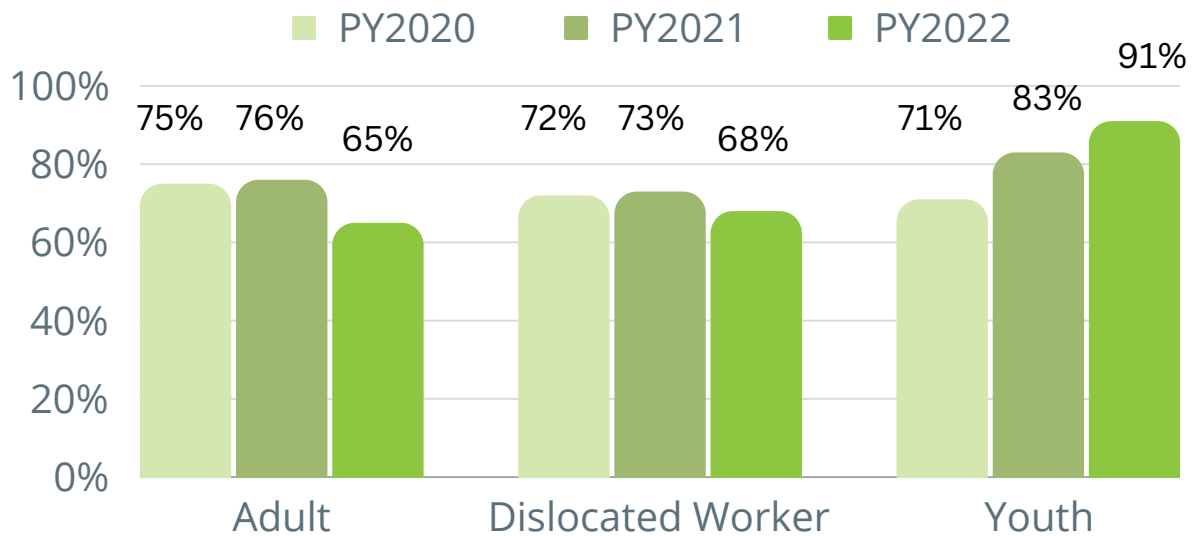

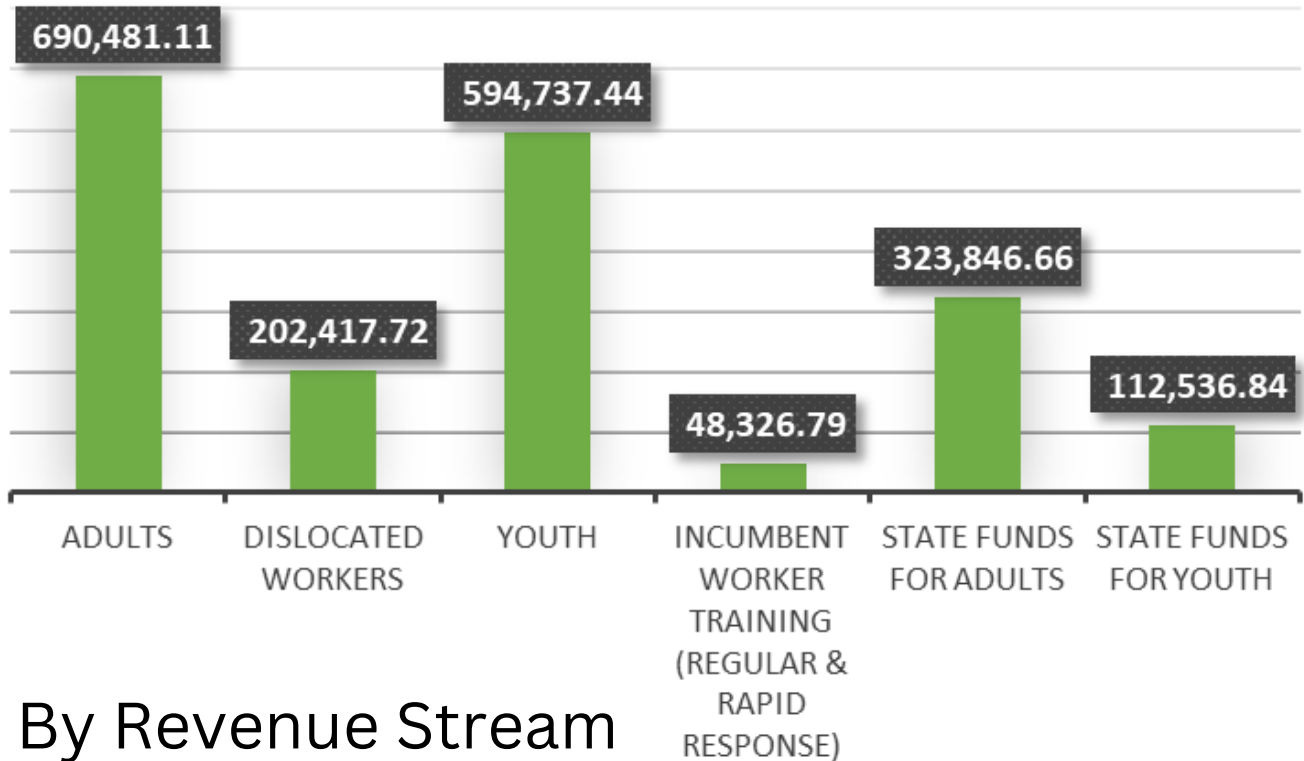

My name is Michelle
and I live in Anderson, SC...

If you're lucky, you figure out your calling while you're still young. I think everyone feels at some point in their life there needs to be something more in their lives.

That's what brought me to the Adult Education Center and the WIOA program. I've known for many years that healthcare, more specifically nursing, was my calling. I knew I would have to obtain my GED to move further in education to achieve this goal.

I was utterly terrified of failing, but not trying terrified me more.

The obstacles that stood in my way were my partner who was in the hospital for 2 months and almost died. I was working a full-time job, then going to classes in the evening. Instead of making excuses, I made myself show up! I was known as the notetaker girl because if I didn't understand a math operation or problem, I wrote down the steps to solve it. I worked on weekends and looked up YouTube videos. I also had friends try to help me. I refused to give myself an out.

What I learned is I could achieve this goal if I didn't give up. I can and will use that thought process as I pursue further education. Living paycheck to paycheck is a hard life, filled with stress; and that was another motivator for making the decisions I have - to change my destiny.

I came to find out that the Adult Education Center and my career coach, Stan Hill, all cheered for me. Every time I came in, I had positive feedback. The teachers were amazing. Everyone learns differently and it takes a lot of courage to say that you don't understand something. There you can without feeling like there's something wrong with you. Everyone strives for you to succeed. I couldn't be more grateful to each one of them. I will always recommend the Adult Education Center and WIOA program through South Carolina Works.

I'm planning to attend Tri-County Technical College to my further education. I will be the first person in my family to attend college.

I wouldn't have this opportunity had it not been for the Adult Education Center and WIOA. Thanks to them for this opportunity, I will not take it for granted.

I am currently employed with Upstate Healthcare Services as a Home Health Aid full-time. I plan to begin classes at Tri-County Tech in the Fall to continue my dream of being a Nurse.

I arrived in South Carolina from Ukraine in October 2022 with my family. I began receiving assistance through Lutheran Services Carolinas. My sister, who moved here some years ago, also helped me with the transition. I found a job working at a local storage facility. It was good to have a job, but this would not be enough pay to support me and my family for the long term. I needed help to find a better-paying job. I was a CDL Driver in Ukraine and wanted to be again. I wasn't sure of how to start the process, and funding for the training was out of reach.

I was referred by Lutheran Services Carolinas to SC Works, and they told me about the WIOA program. I met with Vicky, my WIOA Career Coach, and she helped me through the process. My first step was attending an SC Works orientation. I found out there are a wide variety of training options through WIOA, but my goal remained the same, to get a CDL license.

My career coach helped me break down the CDL license goal into small manageable steps. My first step after enrollment was to study the Test Prep Apps to help me obtain a CDL Class A permit. My limited ability to read English made the CDL permit the largest obstacle to overcome. It was a challenge. My career coach referred me to another program *Every College Campus is a Refuge*. I received help from a Clemson University student to read and translate the test questions. My career coach was there for me too, answering any questions and encouraging me. I was able to pass the CDL permit test and start training at Commercial Driving Academy the next week. Through the excellent training I received from CDA. I had my CDL Class A license within four weeks with no restrictions.

I am very grateful for everything SC Works, WIOA and all the others have done for me. I was fortunate enough to get a job within two days of graduating and receiving my CDL Class A license.

I am very happy to be able to say I have secured a future for my growing family. The WIOA program opens doors to opportunities. If I can do this. You can too.

When I started coming to Oconee Adult Education in October of 2022, I never really realized how much my life and career path would change in such a short time. After I started working on my high school diploma with the adult ed program, I also became involved with Palmetto Youth Connections. In February of this year, I completed my high school diploma. This program has given me the ability to graduate when I did not think that would happen in the past. The teachers and staff at adult ed helped me see the potential I had. I was never the smartest kid before, but I know you must put in the work to get where you want to go. I learned that if you stick with things, and put in the time and effort, you can achieve what you are working for. You must be surrounded with support from the staff and dedication from yourself. I know now that if I can do this, there is no limit to other things I can accomplish if I set my mind to it.

In addition to getting my diploma, I was given the great opportunity to do a job shadow through Palmetto Youth Connections with a Tycoon Fabrication, a welding and fabrication company. Since that time, I was offered a full-time job thanks to the job shadow opportunity with Tycoon. I can learn the welding field while I work in the field I was interested in pursuing. I now can make my own money, learn new skills that will help me now and, in the future and meet new people in the industry. I feel like these are all things that would not have fallen into place without the help of Palmetto Youth Connections, the adult ed program and the teacher's willingness to help students when they need it the most.

Shunquarius enrolled with Palmetto Youth Connections in April of 2023 at the age of 24. At the time of enrollment, he was a high school dropout and was basic skills deficient. Leading up to dropping out of high school, Shunquarius lived at home with his family. The traditional setting did not work out for him, and he dropped out after 10th grade. He decided the GED was best for him and registered with Anderson Adult Education Center and enrolled with Palmetto Youth Connections.



He was eager to take advantage of resources that would benefit him and assist him while pursuing his GED credential. He was offered resume assistance and took all the soft skills classes offered to him. He also benefited from the supportive services available to him, such as transportation assistance.

He persevered during this time and completed his GED rather quickly. Reflecting back, he is grateful for the direction in which he took in going to Adult Ed to complete his high school credential. He is appreciative of his two teachers, the staff at Anderson Adult Education Center and the support of Palmetto Youth Connections.

PYC helped Shunquarius explore his career path choices. He ultimately decided that he wants to be a barber. After career exploration and research, he was referred to discuss this at a barber school and plans on starting training in the fall of this year. He is employed full-time at TTI Ryobi and continues to be successful in the workplace and earns a sustainable income.

This is just the beginning of a rewarding career path for Shundarius. PYC staff looks forward to following up with Shundarius in his successes.

Palmetto Youth Connections had the pleasure of meeting Jon in the fall of 2022. He had recently moved to the area due to some unforeseen circumstances with his family. Historically, Jon had always been home schooled through a Christian home schooling association, but decided pursuing his GED would be his best option.

While in the Palmetto Youth Connections program, Jon received incentives for passing his GED as well as transportation reimbursement to help with gas money to enable him to attend school. He was very appreciative that all his tuition and testing costs were covered by PYC and Adult Education. Jon proved to be an excellent student. All of his GED scores were well above passing.

Jon was clear that he wanted to continue on with his education and he started the I-Best program in January. His enrollment in I-Best prepared him for the nursing program at TCTC. He started the nursing program at TCTC in August 2023 and intends to complete two years at TCTC in the University Transfer program. Jon continues to hold down a job as well, working at Walmart.

Palmetto Youth Connections enjoyed working with this bright young man and is excited to see what his future holds.

Memphis completed the 12th grade and earned a certificate of completion at his former high school. He decided that he wanted to earn his GED. He enrolled with Pelzer Adult Education Center & Palmetto Youth Connections in September 2021 at the age of 18.

During his active enrollment with both programs, he gained two EFL levels on the TABE and made progress in the practice tests for GED. He also received supportive services in the form of transportation reimbursement that assisted him in reaching his set goal of earning his GED. After working hard to finish the goal, he finally completed his GED in January 2023. Memphis has a career pathway goal of becoming a paid fire fighter.

Currently, he is employed in a full-time sales position and is a volunteer fireman in his hometown. PYC staff looks forward to following up with Memphis in his successes.

Jesse enrolled at Pickens County Adult Learning Center in August of 2021. He was a basic skills deficient high school drop out with no work experience. He worked hard for an entire school year and returned to classes in the Fall of 2022. This is a rare occurrence.

Jesse was referred to PYC by his teacher, considering his hard work and good attendance. He was found eligible and was enrolled into PYC in August of 2022. He received transportation reimbursement and incentives while attending GED classes. Jesse met with the Workforce Development Specialist, who was able to offer training for resume and employability, financial literacy, social networking/critical thinking and entrepreneurial training. In addition to these soft skills, he also completed the NIOSH safety class. Jesse was able to post test in October 2022 and made a level gain in math. He continuously attended classes and graduated with his GED in January of 2023. He attended the graduation ceremony in May through PCALC.

Jesse sought and found employment through Kelly Services and is now employed as a custodian at Pickens County Adult Learning Center. He is dedicated and thorough in his employment. He is thoughtful and helpful to the staff.

Jesse said that his “grandparents didn’t have much money and the transportation reimbursement really helped out a lot to come to class and graduate!” We still see Jesse on a daily basis and he is a pleasure to work with! PYC Staff are grateful to have been able to assist this young man.

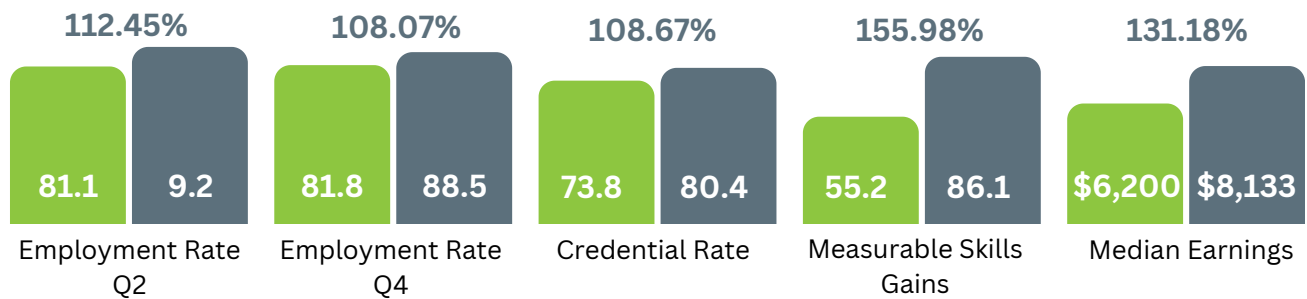

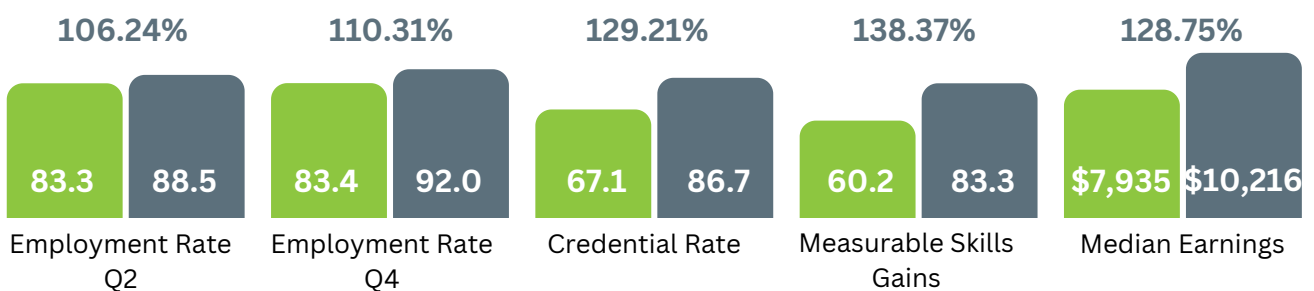

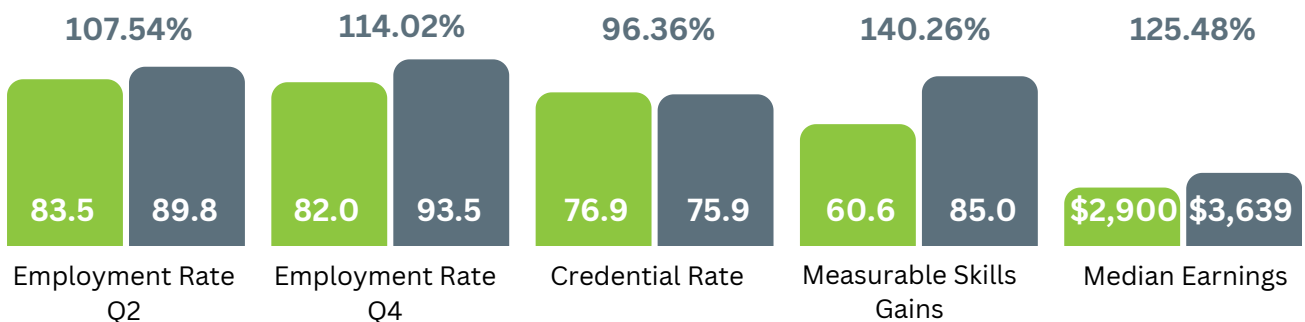
Adult Overall Program Score 123.3%

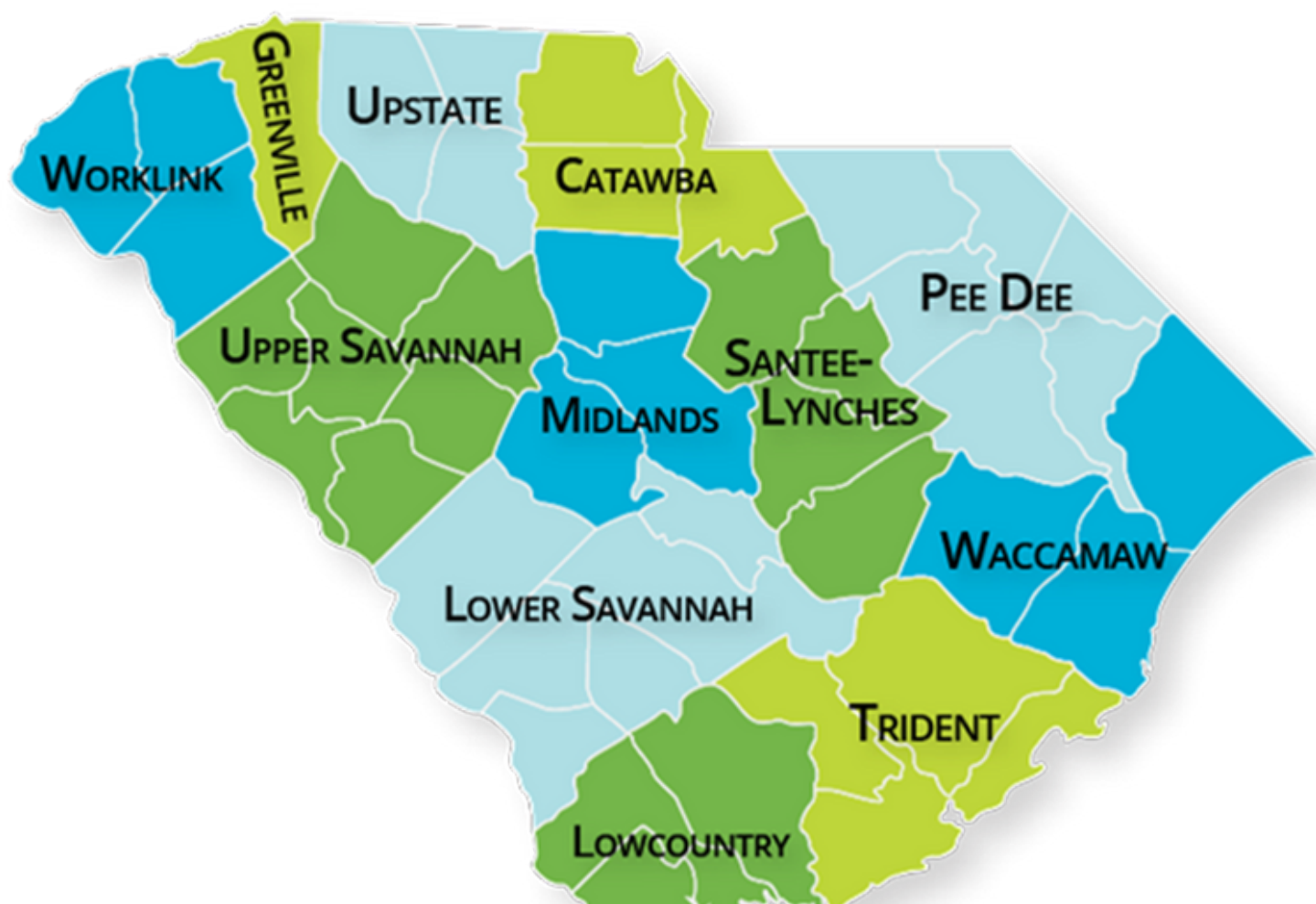
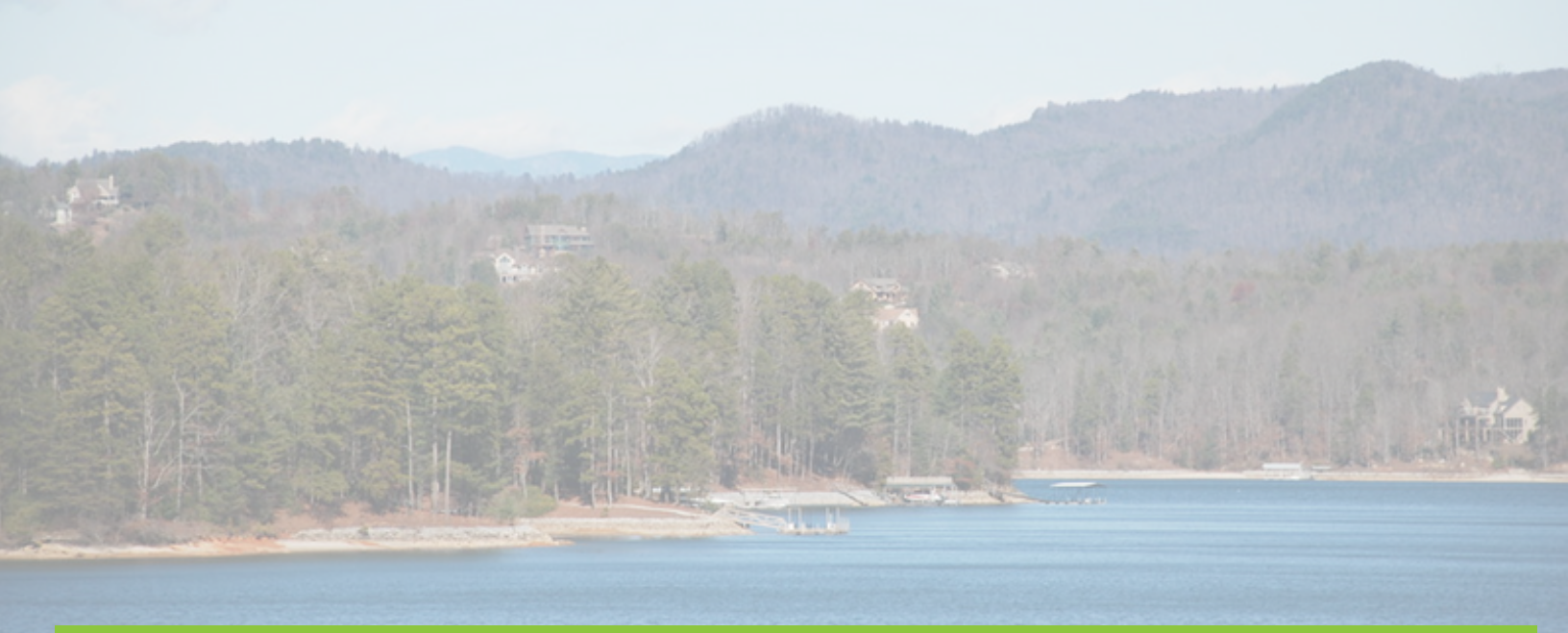
